5. Place your fingers in the center, and gently pull out and up on the corners from the opposite side, forming the buds. Set the finished product in the middle of the dinner plate; you can accessorize with a brooch, as above.

25th

THANKSGIVING

Last year the number one question on the Butterball Turkey Talk-Line was "How do I defrost this thing!?!" Butterball recommends refrigerator thawing: one day for every four pounds.
